**COURSE AVAILABLE** ..... **December 01, 2015**


**New Vehicle Extrication (2015)** curriculum is based on the NFPA 1006 Standard for Technical Rescuer Professional Qualification 2013 Edition and will be available December 01, 2015.

**COURSE PHASE OUT** ..... **December 31, 2016**

**Existing Auto Extrication (1996)** curriculum will continue to be available until December 31, 2016 before it officially retires.

### Vehicle Extrication Course Time Line

**TRANSITION PERIOD**..... **Effective December 1, 2015 – December 31, 2016**



**INSTRUCTOR REQUIREMENTS** ..... **Effective December 1, 2015**

**Vehicle Extrication (2015)** - Current registered instructors of Auto Extrication (1996) are authorized to instruct the new curriculum. New instructors will be required to either take the course or apply for a Pace II review of their instructor qualifications, including appropriate education and practical experience relating to course content.

## **POTENTIAL AGENCY IMPACTS**

Fire agencies utilizing Auto Extrication as a minimum qualification for promotions need to review the new Vehicle Extrication curriculum to be sure that all agency training needs are being met. If not, the local agency may need to augment the curriculum at the local level.

Accredited Regional Training Programs (ARTP), Accredited Local Academies (ALA), community colleges and all other local delivery venues need to review the curriculum and seek approval from their curriculum committee / program sponsor, as appropriate. ARTPs should review the new Vehicle Extrication curriculum and discuss with their advisory committees to determine if the curriculum must be expanded to meet local needs.
